ABOUT THE INSTRUMENT

The Narcissistic Personality Inventory (NPI) was developed by Raskin and Hall (1979) for the measurement of narcissism as a personality trait in social psychological research. It is based on the definition of narcissistic personality disorder (NPD) found in the DSM, but is not a diagnostic tool for NPD and instead measures subclinical or normal expressions of narcissism. So, even someone who gets the highest possible score on the NPI does not necessarily have NPD.

The questionnaire presents the client with forty pairs of statements and they are asked to select the one that is closer to their own feelings.

BASIC INFORMATION

My name is Demo Client. I am a 49 year old Male. I have completed this assessment as a recommendation from my spouse. I believe this assessment is a waste of time.

NPI RESULT

Demo Client's responses to the Narcissistic Personality Inventory (NPI) resulted in a **final score of 16 out of 40**. The average score for the general population is 15.3

Higher scores may indicate greater levels of narcissism.

COMPONENT TRAITS

The creators of this questionnaire stress that it is important to consider which traits are dominant. For example, an overall score that reflects more points on vanity, entitlement, exhibitionism and exploitiveness is more cause for concern than someone who scores high on authority, self-sufficiency, and superiority. Client responses are grouped by component and the score for each component are displayed in the tables below. Responses in bold were used in determining the NPI final score.

Authority - Component Score: 3

I am not good at influencing people.
I am not too concerned about success.
I see myself as a good leader.
I am assertive.
I don't mind following orders.
Being an authority doesn't mean that much to me.
It makes little difference to me whether I am a leader or not.
I am a born leader.

Self-Sufficiency - Component Score: 2

If I feel competent I am willing to take responsibility for making decisions.
Sometimes I am not sure of what I am doing.
I rarely depend on anyone else to get things done.
People can't always live their lives in terms of what they want.
I am going to be a great person.
There is a lot that I can learn from other people.

Superiority - Component Score: 2

When people compliment me I sometimes get embarrassed.
I am no better or worse than most people.
I like to be complimented.
I don't like people to pry into my life for any reason.
I am an extraordinary person.

Exhibitionism - Component Score: 3

I am essentially a modest person.
I would do almost anything on a dare.
I prefer to blend in with the crowd.
I try not to be a show off.
I don't care about new fads and fashions.
I really like to be the center of attention.
I get upset when people don't notice how I look when I go out in public.

Exploitativeness - Component Score: 3

I can usually talk my way out of anything.
I find it easy to manipulate people.
People are sometimes hard to understand.
Sometimes I tell good stories.
I can make anybody believe anything I want them to.

Vanity - Component Score: 1

I don't particularly like to show off my body.
I like to look at my body.
I am not particularly interested in looking at myself in the mirror.

Entitlement - Component Score: 2

If I ruled the world it would be a better place.
I usually get the respect that I deserve.
I just want to be reasonably happy.
I like to do things for other people.
I will never be satisfied until I get all that I deserve.
Power for its own sake doesn't interest me.
